So, I started that semester with five total classes, two of which were honors. See what I mean about ambitious?

I decided to take History of American People since 1877 with Dr. Gene Vinzant and Intro into Gender Studies with Sharon Fox. I knew I would enjoy History of American People since 1877 because I have always been a history fanatic. That to date is one of my favorite classes I took during my time at NWACC. I liked that Dr. Vinzant philosophy was that he loves US History and he wanted to make sure we loved it to. Going into that class I honestly did not know much about American History. I walked out of it by the end of the semester knowing so much that it has helped me in my job on many occasions as well as that class continued to foster my love of History. Intro into Gender Studies, however I had really no idea what I was getting myself into. My advisor told me it would be a change of pace class, and you will learn things you never expected to learn. In the Fall of 2023 semester, I had planned to take the semester off. My kids needed me more presents after the previous semester being so full. Then I was sent an email about


